What's the best way to avoid spam emails?

Use free email services that include spam filtering. Never click on links in a spam email; in some cases, clicking will result in you confirming to the spammer that the email address is valid and the user is likely to click on links thus making you a prime target for more spam and phishing attacks.

What scams do fraudsters use?

'Phishing' and 'vishing' are the two main types of scams criminals will use to try to gain access to your personal details. They can then use these details to sign in to your online account, steal information and potentially take your money.

'Phishing' is any activity designed to trick you into giving out your personal details such as usernames and passwords - this is normally done by email.

'Vishing' is done over the phone when criminals impersonate a person or business and try to get you to provide your personal details.

How to spot a scam

Phishing and vishing scams can happen at any time and people can be targeted around payment dates. Here are some top tips to spot them.

Phishing emails are often sent in bulk and are unlikely to contain both your first and last name; they commonly start: 'Dear'. Check the quality of the communication - misspelling, poor punctuation and bad grammar are common signs of bogus emails or text messages.

Fraudsters will try to create a sense of urgency as a way of pressuring you in to giving your personal details. For example, they'll say things like 'failure to respond in 24 hours will result in your account being closed'.

How to avoid these scams. Here are some tips to help you stay safe:

Keep an eye out for any emails, phone calls or SMS messages you think are suspicious, especially at the time you're expecting a payment or delivery. You shouldn't post messages online that let people know you're getting your any finance payment soon; this could make you a target for fraudsters.

Always ensure that you're using a secure website when submitting sensitive information online and don't post personal info on social media pages.

Avoid logging in to your finance account on public networks or computers.

If you receive a phone call that you're suspicious about, don't feel pressured in to giving the requested details just hang up. Call on a number you know is genuine from their contact page using a different phone line.



Remember to share your experience of scams and other fraudulent activities with colleagues; it helps everyone.
